
Year 4 have had! We have loved travelling back in time to immerse ourselves in our Veni, Vidi, Vici topic to explore the question: "What is the legacy of the Roman Empire?" To our



surprise we have found that the Romans were not so rotten! We have learnt all about the importance of the Roman army in developing the empire and have created battle formations under our commanding centurion. We have discovered that the Romans are

responsible for many amazing inventions such as roads, place names, central heating and even influencing the architecture of our buildings. We loved our exciting trip to Peterborough Museum where, like true archaeologists, the children were able to handle real Roman artefacts to discover what life was like for those who lived during this period of time. We have certainly taken a journey through time: the rise of the Roman Empire, the devastation and rediscovery of Pompeii and of course most recently, learning about Roman food. Our challenge was to research and develop a Roman recipe -

Paupers Pottage. As food technicians, we learnt about the origins of our ingredients, tasted and chose the flavours we most liked; practised preparing and chopping our vegetables and finally tasted and evaluated our stew. A delicious experience for most! Of course, the children



The Vile Victorians has been a fantastic first topic for us and we have covered so much: the lives of the rich and poor, the Industrial Revolution, the workhouse, plus school life. All of this was truly brought to life with our Victorian experience day in school. The children's wonderful costumes and classroom experience have really helped them understand what life may have been like for Victorian children. How times have



changed! We also looked at the Victorian inventor Brunel and designed and constructed bascule bridges as part of our D&T project. We investigated the life of William Morris, a famous Victorian artist and undertook some printing based on his style of

repeated patterns and nature. We've also worked closely with our PE partners Inspire+ and been fortunate to participate in assemblies focusing on mental wellbeing. This has been an actionpacked term with many exciting activities happening to support our classroom learning. We can't wait for next term! We would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a very happy and restful Christmas



Although their last two years of school life have been interrupted, the Year 6 team have been astounded with how the children have started their last year of primary school with such enthusiasm and a continued love of learning. Our history topic 'We'll Meet Again' took us back to 1939, when Britain went to war with Germany. During this topic, the children have explored who was involved in the war; why children were evacuated; the importance of rationing as well as the main events during the war such as: Kristallnacht, Dunkirk and D-Day. Our class book, 'Letters from the Lighthouse' has been a great stimulus for our writing and reading lessons throughout this term. It has been wonderful to see such passion for their English work. To immerse the children into the topic, we took a visit to the Holocaust Centre, where we followed the story of Leo, a German boy, in World War Two. The children learnt about Kristallnacht and had the opportunity to listen to a survivor's story from the



war. They empathised with these people and were able to discuss their learning throughout the day. We ended the term by studying 'The Christmas Truce' and wrote our own narrative. In addition to all our history learning, we have studied light in our science lessons and have explored why God is loving and holy in our RE lessons. The children's perseverance with their learning has been fantastic and we are all so proud! From all of us in Year 6, we hope all our families have a happy and safe Christmas holiday and we look forward to welcoming the children back in the new year!





We shared the story, "Pumpkin Soup" by Helen Cooper. The children read a recipe using their phonic skills and then prepared all the ingredients. What an incredible start we have had in Year Two! We have most definitely been 'off to great places,' as part of the

topic 'Oh, the Places You'll Gol'. During term one we learnt about transport from the present and in the past. We developed our historical enquiry by using iPads to research and our observational skills to examine primary source artefacts, when learning about Raymond Mays. A 'wow' moment was one sunny September morning when we were exceptionally lucky to have the privilege of seeing a collection of vintage cars. The children made observational drawings, asked questions and learnt technical vocabulary about the



vehicles. We used this knowledge to design, construct and evaluate a 3D model car of our own!

We started term two travelling across the stormy sea to the fictional Isle of Struay, where the children learnt about island life through the captivating Katie Morag stories. A highlight has been our Katie Morag cross-curricular activities. We created a tartan patterned skirt for Katie Morag, baked

scrumptious Scottish biscuits and identified the human and physical features of Scottish Islands using our map skills. During Friendship Week, we studied the text 'Katie Morag

and the Tiresome Ted.' We thoughtfully reflected on the qualities needed to be a 'good' friend, showcasing the Christian Values of Friendship and Compassion.

We can't quite believe how quickly this term has flown by but we have been so impressed with the children's enthusiasm and commitment to their learning. All of the Year Two Team would like to wish you a very Merry Christmas and we look forward to welcoming you back in the New Year.
