The children have had a wonderful time finding out about the jobs of the Crossing Patrol, Police, Firefighters, Ambulance & Paramedics. The children had lots of questions to ask him about what he does BUT.....the highlight was when everyone got a turn sitting and pretending to drive the tractor (including the teachers), wow how exciting! Then it was countdown to our visit to Sacrewell Farm. We learnt lots about different farm animals from alpacas to peacocks. What a special time of year to visit a farm! Wow! What amazing adventures Year One have been on to explore The Unknown! We sailed into Term 3

Finally, we rounded off the term with a sensational production to showcase all of our learning about both explorers and thoroughly enjoyed learning to sign Million Dreams – what incredibly enthusiastic and talented children you all have! lear 2 started 2019 in style with Partake Theatre visiting us on our very first day back! We were transported back to London in 1666 to introduce our very popular topic, "London's Burning...Fetch the Engines!" During our fabulous workshop we used our acting skills to become scurrying rats, terrified Londoners and dancing flames! In the classroom we had our very own Thomas Farrinor's Bakery in our role play area and the children have loved imagining what it would have been like to have worked there all those years ago. We applied our Maths skills in the Bakery as we cut up loaves of bread into halves, guarters and thirds. In English, an area of the school was transformed into a multi-sensory experience, complete with the sound of crackling flames, bustling streets and the smell of burning wood. We read the tale of Sammy the Street Dog and this inspired our children to create fantastic adventure stories describing The Great Fire from an animal's perspective. Another highlight of the term was seeing our children shine in our year group assembly where they were able to share their learning through music, dance and drama! The topic came to a smouldering end when we invited Bourne Fire Brigade to set alight our amazing Tudor Houses that were completed as part of our take care homework. It was incredible to see how quickly the fire could spread, just like it did in 1666.

This term our topic is 'What's for Lunch, Bert?' which is based around the brilliant story of The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch. We have encountered some very impressive vocabulary which we have been using in our own writing to write effective book reviews as well as a diary written from the perspective of Mr Grinling, the industrious lighthouse keeper whose lunch is sabotaged! The children are so engaged in their exciting learning experiences and continue to impress us with their incredible homework efforts and enthusiasm. Thank you for



your continued support and we hope you have a very happy Easter! Wow! What a term! We've worked so hard we've managed to squeeze in not one but two awesome topics! We started with our fairy tale topic, There's Two Sides to



Every Story, where we began by investigating a bizarre crime scene, littered with evidence of mischief and mayhem. Over the following weeks, we discovered all was not as it seemed as we examined alternative versions of some of our favourite stories. A particular highlight was getting to

meet the author and illustrator, Bethan Woollvin, who inspired us to write our own fractured fairy tales. We learnt so much from her and we love including her suspense filled sentences in our own writing. Then, we went on a journey through space and time and discovered a Neolithic settlement. As we explored the site we were able to find out what life in the Stone Age was really like, but we had to make a sharp exit when we disturbed a herd of ferocious sabre tooth tigers! We then continued our research when we visited Flag Fen. We also created our very own bourbon biscuit Stonehenges, made Stone Age beast mobiles and we were even 'lucky' enough to sample a delicious Stone

Age fruit stew! Phew, what a term! I think we need a well -earned rest!

Article 28 : Every child to an education. Year 4 have had such a marvellous Spring term! We started in January by taking a trip back in time to 1914, where we explored Ernest Shackleton's treacherous expedition to step foot on the then much undiscovered continent of Antarctica. We learnt about how the crew managed to overcome such turmoil and wrote our own diary entries from their point of view, documenting the terrifying and life changing ordeal. In science, we learnt about different habitats and where animals prefer to live. We loved linking our English and science together, where we created a non-chronological report all about our favourite animals that live in



Antarctica. We also had a mysterious crash landing at our school! Beegu, a lonely creature from space, found himself lost on Earth and we tried our best to keep him here, although he wanted to travel back to his parents, proving 'home really is where the heart is'! As well as all the exciting English, topic and science work we have completed, Year 4 had the time of their lives on their residential visit to Caythorpe. The children took part in activities such as the High Ropes, buggy building, archery, Giant Swing and challenge course. Year 5

What an amazing time we've had in Year 5! The children have dived into our exciting Groovy Greeks topic, the children have been learning, across the curriculum, about Pandora and how her curiosity got the better of her, as well as a range of other myths and legends. We have also studied Ancient Greek architecture, created outstanding Greek columns and became archaeologists for the day, digging up Greek poo!

We have also been learning about water, focusing on the Water Cycle, key features of rivers and the main ones both in the UK and around the world. This has also linked



to developing our geographical knowledge of continents, countries and cities around the world. We were very fortunate to participate in an Anglian Water day, where we focused on how we get our water, how it is cleaned and what we can do to conserve it and the impact if we don't. We have also participated in Fairtrade Fortnight, studying what Fairtrade is, why it's important and the goods we can

purchase.
