
A Christmas Blessing from **Father Chris**

Wow! What a way to start the year! We really could not have squeezed any more learning into our first term in Year 3. We started the year with our totally

What a fantastic first term Year 4 have had! We have travelled



We discovered a peculiar egg, which we found out was a dragon egg. Year 4 have had such enthusiasm for our learning about Hiccup and Toothless in the story 'How to Train your dragon', which linked to our Vikings learning. We created our own dragons, wrote our own description of them and even created a nonchronological report! Year 4 should also be so proud of their achievements in our year group assembly 'Veni, Vidi, Vici'. The performance saw the children work incredibly hard to learn lines and words of songs and they sported some awesome



Wow, what an outstanding start to this academic year! The children have really shown a willingness to take on the challenges and responsibilities of Year 6: enthusiastically taking on roles such as

house captains, police cadets, tour guides, sports ambassadors and many other jobs that help the school to run smoothly. Our topic - Blitz Britz- has run across our whole curriculum,



enabling the children to become really immersed in the events and lives of those who lived during this period of time. We have written preparation leaflets for the war; dramatic newspaper articles about the Blitz and even created a role play interview of a fisherman involved in Operation Dynamo. Our fascinating trip to Beth Shalom allowed the children to understand what life was like for Jewish people living in Nazi Germany and this was reflected in the emotive diary entries the children wrote, from the point of view of a Jewish boy. During our World War 2 enrichment day the children began by presenting our fun and fact-filled

year group assembly, where they could really showcase their learning to you all. The day was then filled with war-time baking; code-breaking and creating London Blitz skylines. Even our class book – Letters from The Lighthouse by Emma Carroll - was set during WW2. We have loved reading it and as well as learning more about our topic, it has enabled us to develop deeper inference skills. The stunning 'take care' homework that has been arriving into our classrooms reflects the enthusiasm for this topic and we are looking forward to sharing this wonderful work across the year group. The children deserve a well earned Christmas break and we look forward to an equally hard-working and exciting term in the New Year.
