Our Trust vision drives all that we do at our Church schools and our values are theologically grounded with clear links to the Christian narrative through Bible quotes and stories.

We believe the Christian Values that we have chosen strongly represent our Academy Trust. We encourage our pupils to reflect on and articulate our values to each other, to their parents, to staff and to visitors. The Bible has so much to offer us in terms of positive personal, relational and community values, and its timeless wisdom can help us pass on to the next generation the qualities of life that are most valuable and which, as Christians, we believe are not only God-given but also can be God-energised in our lives. We develop our values through modelling it to one another; looking at Christian scripture and stories in Collective Worship. Through whole school worship, class worship, relationships and discussions, we use bible stories to provide examples of our values and also explicitly give examples of how our pupils can show and recognise these values within our schools.



Our chosen Christian Values are:

Creation and Creativity

The Bible opens with an account of how God created the Universe and all the things within it. Although Christians have different views on scientific accounts on the creation of the universe, all hold God as the creator. We believe we are made in the image of God and because He is creative, it follows that so are we. If God does something, and models it for us to do, we believe we should strive to do the same and to have the same impact. The Bible tells us we have been handed the responsibility for looking after this planet – something that most would agree that we could do a better job at. Obvious links throughout the curriculum can be made to current environmental issues and the importance of our role as stewards of the planet. Through our values and Eco initiatives in particular, we encourage our pupils to be Agents of Change and to make a difference in the local community and beyond by following God's example and striving to fulfil His expectations.

Focus Bible Story: The story of Creation (Genesis 1:1-31)

Friendship and Fellowship

The Bible is full of examples of friendship and this is why friendship is such an important Christian Value for our Trust. Jesus gave us a definition of love and friendship in John 15:13 - to lay down one's life for one's friend. As children we spend more time with our friends than with our family, we celebrate with our friends, we eat and drink with friends, we take holidays with friends and we are there when a friend is in need. Jesus didn't just talk about friendship, he acted it out throughout his life. Jesus was the friend of sinners and he showed them mercy, sympathy, forgiveness, love and charity – he modelled what it is to be a good friend. He is our model for friendship because he loved and was a friend without limits. We use Jesus' model of friendship to teach, encourage and inspire our pupils to be the best friend they could possibly be to others. Across the Trust we have a Friendship Week rather than Anti-Bullying Week in Term 2 every year but the importance of friendship as a Christian Value is woven throughout the time our pupils are with us from Reception to Year 6.

Focus Bible Story: Ruth and Naomi (Ruth 1-4)

Additional Bible verse: 1 Corinthians 13:4-7 This is a blueprint for how we live in love and friendship. Through this we can explore what love and friendship means.

Perseverance

We chose perseverance as a Christian Value because we strive for our children to have self-belief and to aspire to reach their potential in all areas of life. We recognise that a culture of perseverance is essential throughout their school journey. There are lots of verses in the Bible that encourage Christians to persevere and these pieces of scripture help to motivate us all. Jesus frequently encouraged his disciples to “endure patiently” the difficulties and obstacles they encountered and to persevere in the face of adversity. We believe it is necessary to teach our pupils that things that are often worthwhile in life cannot be achieved without perseverance, that life is sometimes difficult and that it is important not to give up in the face of adversity. We regularly praise our pupils for their perseverance in our weekly ‘Golden Book’ Collective Worship in front of their peers and parents / guardians.

Focus Bible Story: The Parable of the Lost sheep (Matthew 18:12-14)

Forgiveness

We appreciate that forgiveness is fundamental to the character of God. Throughout the Bible, God is described as slow to anger, abounding in love and forgiving sin. Jesus also teaches forgiveness. Forgiveness was at the heart of everything he did and is at the heart of the Lord's Prayer. We inspire our pupils to forgive others and themselves knowing that forgiveness cannot be given or received unless it is asked for, and this must come from the heart. We ensure that our pupils understand that forgiveness can be difficult because of the hurt involved but Christians believe that they have the ability to forgive others not because they're good people or because they want to do the right thing, but because God has given us the capacity to forgive because He forgave us first. We teach our pupils that the value of forgiveness is that it allows us to be more like Christ and when we forgive we are able to move forward and have a fresh start.

Focus Bible Story: The story of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10)

Trust

Trust is at the heart of all positive relationships. We teach our pupils that in life trust has to be earned and that trust is key to living together in harmony and so it is to be valued and honoured. The Bible tells Christians that God is trustworthy because of His nature and that they should have confidence in Him. The Bible strongly advises us all to trust in God and to have faith in His grace, protection, and salvation. There are 39 references to trust in the David's Psalms alone and there are an endless number of Bible stories that we can draw on as a model for trusting God and others. When we talk about trust we also talk about faith. We understand that they are two different concepts but at the same time they compliment each other. Christians have faith in God because He is trustworthy.

Thankfulness

The word 'thankfulness' is not a common word in the Bible but the Bible does tell us that God loves and cares for us in many different ways in all aspects of our lives. We encourage our pupils to respond to this gift with thankfulness and praise. Songs of thankfulness and praise are at the heart of Christian worship. We use worship songs, bible stories, Christian Festivals such as Harvest, prayers throughout the day (e.g. lunchtime, home time) and current affairs to help the children realise and understand the importance of saying and most importantly feeling thankful. Our Key Stage 2 pupils regularly go to church for the Eucharist or 'thanksgiving'.

Respect and Reverence

Respect is a core Christian value for our church schools because we believe that all life is precious, within the image of God, and deserves to be valued. Within the school we encourage all, “to treat others as you would want them to treat you.” (Matthew 7:12) Respect is one of the most foundational and important lessons we can teach our pupils about interacting with other people. From respecting elders to respecting people with different backgrounds to respecting other children’s wishes, the need for respect is everywhere. In our schools, our pupils learn that God made us all different and unique. This is something that we can celebrate together. We learn to value ourselves, each other and the wider community through honesty, tolerance and trust, where everyone has an equal right to our care, time and attention as a reflection of God’s love. Throughout his life, Jesus showed respect for the disciples, children, the poor, the sick and the distressed and through our British Values work and our 3Rs we are able to model and promote respect in our schools and in the wider community.

Our 3Rs are:

Respect and take care of ourselves.

Respect and take care of others.

Respect and take care of our environment and the world in which we live.

Peace

Jesus said “Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.” (Matthew 5:9) Peace making actions can range from helping to resolve conflict to creating space for stillness. Peace, in the sense of total well-being, is God’s intention for the whole of creation. Throughout our church schools our pupils have access to Reflection Areas where they can sit, be still and talk to God. Pupils are encouraged to use these areas for not only reflection but to share with God the positive things that are happening in their lives. We believe that there are five types of peace that our pupils need to learn about through listening, discussion, exploring and modelling:

- Peace with God
- Inner peace
- Peace between each other
- Peace in the community
- Peace in the world

We have Peer Mediators in our playgrounds to ensure playtimes and lunchtimes are as harmonious as they can be. The Peer Mediators are trained to help pupils work through conflict and to encourage them to express their feelings in an appropriate way.

We encourage our pupils to understand that finding and making peace is hard work and once it is found, it needs to be cherished. Our pupils are encouraged to see that there is a time for peace and a time to unwind at home, in school and in the community.

Focus Bible Story: The Stilling of the Storm (Matthew 8:23-27)

Courage

God promises to give us the strength and courage we need to face difficult or challenging situations. Courage and perseverance go hand in hand. Courage guides us and our actions. We encourage our pupils to find the courage to use their voice, to ask big questions, to stand their ground and to try things that are out of their usual comfort zone. The word courage comes from the French word for heart. Take heart is another way of saying be courageous. We teach our pupils that being courageous doesn't mean that you aren't scared. We look to the Bible and to history for stories of courageous people who have been scared, but they stood up for what was right anyway. In the book of Joshua, it says 'Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go'. Jesus often says to people 'don't be afraid'. That sentence turns up 365 times in the Bible! We teach our pupils that Christians believe that when things seem difficult and hard that they can rely on God to strengthen their courage.

Focus Bible Story: David and Goliath (1 Samuel 17)

Memory verses:

Compassion

Throughout the Trust, we develop our value of Compassion through modelling it to one another and understanding that it is a call to action. We show compassion locally through supporting local Foodbanks and other local charities. Nationally and internationally we have supported charities such as Children in Need, Sport Relief and then beyond our shores we are partnered with the charity 'Friends of Nyansakia'. Nyansakia is a village in Kisii in the central district in West Kenya and we have been able to make a positive difference through our fundraising efforts over many years.

Christians believe the Bible teaches that God is a God of compassion and that God feels the suffering of His people. God's compassion is expressed in His mercy, kindness, patience, grace, forgiveness and love. Many Christians believe they are called by God to be compassionate people. In essence, compassion is a feeling of sympathy, empathy and a need to take action to relieve the suffering of those close to us and further afield. We encourage our pupils to be compassionate and conscientious 'Agents of Change' at home, in school and in the local community. We want them to be inspired to act for something they feel compelled to change.

Focus Bible Story: The Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-27)

Hope

Christian hope is rooted in God's love for us. Christians believe that:

- God has our best interests at heart;
- God will never leave us;
- God will provide for us when we are in need;
- God knows us (even the number of hairs on our head!)
- God promises us of a better life to come.
- When we are in our darkest time, God is there, and will help us.
- Hope is grounded in the character of God.

We have high hopes and aspirations for our pupils future, our school and our community. We also understand that faith gives us hope for both now and for the future, and that this hope brings confidence. Hope for us means that there is always a future whatever situation we are in, because God promised to never leave us, to always love us, and to help us in times of need. We see hope shown in the Christian narrative in many ways:

- The resurrection gives us hope for eternal life.
- The gospel stories tell of hope, for example the woman who touched Jesus' robe ("If I just touch his clothes I will be healed.").
- The rainbow after the flood is a sign that God will never break His covenant of love with us.
- God used Moses to lead the Israelites out of Egypt, when slavery seemed their destiny.
- The lost coin and the lost sheep tell us of the lengths God will go to bring us back.

We develop our value of hope through: never giving up on our pupils; wanting the best for them academically and in their character; helping them see light despite the darkness; investing in our Health and Wellbeing teams and learning about the importance of prayer.

Humility

Humility is a core Christian value. It is key to how Christians relate to each other. The Bible tells us Jesus taught his disciples what it means to be truly humble by demonstrating and valuing humility. Christians believe that they can serve God by demonstrating humility through their attitudes and actions. This is in contrast to the world we live in where some people say: "look at me, look at me", chasing after fame and recognition and wanting to be noticed. Yet the real 'heroes' are usually the everyday people who care and think of others without a fuss and a need for attention. We teach our pupils that being humble means having a realistic picture of ourselves and to be mindful of the times we do amazing things as well as the times we don't succeed; it is about trying to think about others before you think about yourself and about being humble enough to ask and accept another person's help. We are careful to ensure that our pupils know it is acceptable to celebrate an 'Agent of Change' accomplishment or their own personal achievements, for example in our weekly 'Golden Book' Collective Worships.

"Humility is not thinking less of yourself, but thinking of yourself less," C.S. Lewis
