Q&A with Sophie Anderson

'The Snow Girl' is our book of the month and luckily we managed to catch Sophie Anderson for a quick chat.

Your books are all based on Folk/fairy tales. Do you pick the ones that were told to you as a child or do you find new, unheard of ones?

The stories my grandmother told me when I was a child are my favourites, so I usually start with one of those. Once I've chosen a tale, I read all the different versions I can find, research the history and interpretations, and seek out related and similar stories. This process always leads me to discover new things about the tale I've chosen.

The House With Chicken Legs was a huge success and was turned into a play. Which of your other books would you like to see adapted and how?

I love stop motion animation and would be thrilled if any of my books were adapted for this medium!

Your books are often set in other countries. The Lake District is one of the most beautiful parts of our country, would you write a book set there?

The Lake District is beautiful and provides endless inspiration for me. It has appeared in some of my books, under different names. All my books are set in a 'Once Upon a Time, Far Away' world, so I don't use real place names.

I do love rooting my stories in the real world though, and look to my own surroundings to help me describe my settings in an authentic way.

The Snow Girl is set in a quiet valley surrounded by mountains, that is in many ways similar to several valleys in The Lake District. Most winters, we have some lovely snow here too - not quite as much as there is in The Snow Girl, but enough to help me write some snowy scenes!

What are your favourite recent books for children?

Man Man and the Tree of Memories by Yaba Badoe & Joelle Avelino is utterly gorgeous, a heart-speeding celebration of carnival, life, love, and freedom.

The Last Storyteller by Donna Barba Higuera is an extraordinary, outstanding blend of science fiction, Mexican folklore, and dystopian fantasy.

Adia Kelbara and the Circle of Shamans by Isi Hendrix is spectacular; a vivid, thrilling, heart-speeding fantasy adventure threaded through with important and powerful truths.

Christmas Comes Early

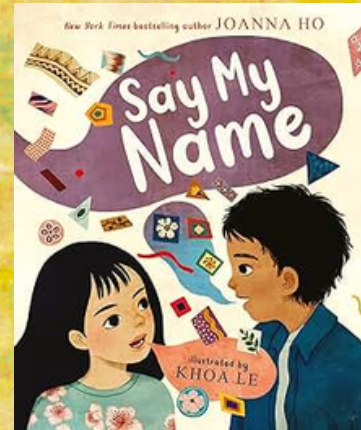

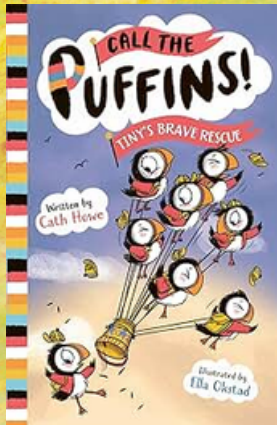


Call the Puffins: Tiny's Brave Rescue

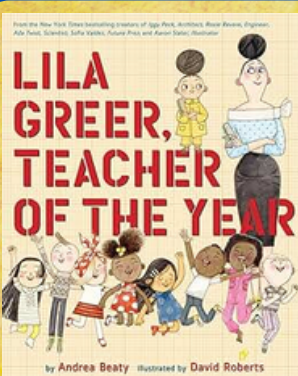


The Last Stardog

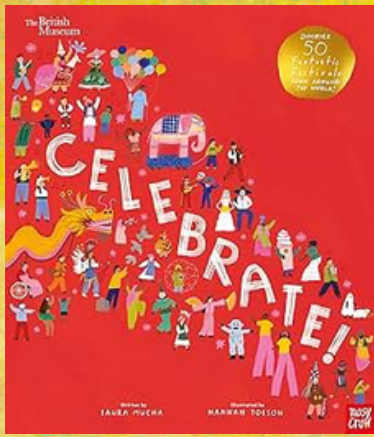


One To Wait for...

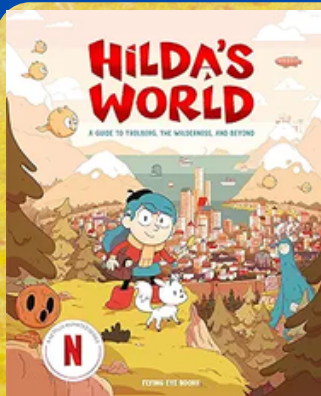
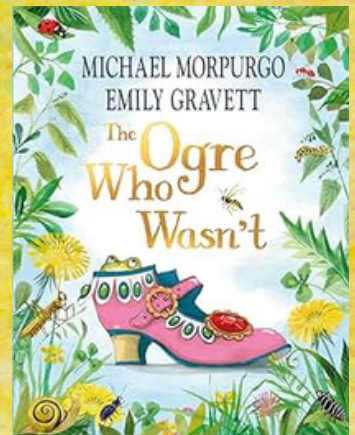

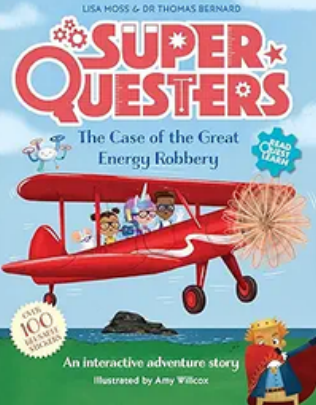


One You Might Have Missed
