

What an incredible start we have had in Year 2! We have most definitely had an exciting beginning to our topic 'Danger... Dungeons and Dragons!'. One day, the children arrived at school to find that a mysterious, colourful egg had appeared in each classroom! They predicted what they thought the animal could be and in English, we wrote a set of instructions detailing how we could care for the egg until it hatched. We drew on our science knowledge about how to care for animals and to our surprise, out hatched a beautiful, baby dragon! Meanwhile in history, we began to learn about the Norman invasion. The children

What an amazing start to Key Stage 2 we've had! This year has been packed with exciting lessons that have captured our imaginations and kept us all on the edge of our seats.


